Chimenea Outdoor heater Guide

Ensure your chimenea is placed on a flat, level and stable base to prevent it from tipping over. To start a fire in the chimenea use some newspaper or a firelighter. Use a butane grill lighter or a long fireplace match to carefully light the newspaper and/or firelighter. Once the kindling has gone, carefully add a few more fire logs into the chimenea. By this point, the fire should be burning well. Add dry, seasoned, split firewood inside when required.

SAFETY ADVICE

- Take extra precaution when lighting the chimenea, make sure children and pets are kept at a safe distance.
- Do not Place Chimenea too closely to anything that could easily melt or burn as the chimenea can get very hot and avoid anything flammable from the chimenea must be placed on a flat surface.
- Never Place on a sloping surface where the fire might tip over. This should be a NON-FLAMMABLE surface such as stone, gravel or bricks.
- You must not place on grass which may turn brown. Do not place on wood which may turn brown or catch fire. DO NOT PLACE ON DECKING.
- Never Place your fire near bushes or plants or under trees; the heat will damage the leaves and will present a fire hazard.
- DO NOT place your real fire under an awning; it will burn or melt.
- Never ever place your real fire near garden furniture, especially made of fabric or woven plastic, which may melt or catch fire. We recommend at least one metre distance.
- DO NOT make a real fire inside a conservatory or summer house or shed;
 real fires are designed to be outside, and fumes emanating from the fire made with wood, coal or charcoal are toxic and dangerous to health.
- Never touch the real fire when burning; the surface is hot and you will burn your fingers
- Do not ever allow children, especially small children, near the fire. Do not allow pets near the fire.

- Be careful not to fuel the fire, if flames are coming out of the top of the chimenea, then the fire is too large.
- Never throw water on a real fire other than in an emergency.
- Never leave a burning patio fire unattended.
- Do not ever attempt to move a real patio fire while the fire is burning.
